COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Your committee members submit the financial report of the Peninsula Community Centre Inc. for the financial year ended 30 June, 2012.

Committee Members

The names of committee members throughout the year and at the date of this report are:

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the association during the financial year were:

to provide Before & After School and Vacation Care childcare services, community services and activities, coordinate and/or provide services to frail aged people, people with disabilities and their carers, in the Gosford LGA and to people on the Central Coast of NSW.

Operating Result

The profit after providing for income tax amounted to \$394,596 (2011: \$312,498 profit).

Objectives

The association continues to pursue its objectives of providing community welfare activities, youth services, childcare and children's activities, adult education, and support and assistance to frail, aged and other Australians through its community aged care programs.

Strategies

The four key objectives of the Strategic Plan continue to guide service development and delivery:

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES: Building and delivering a broad range of accessible, affordable and high quality programs and services that meet community need and promote individual and community, social, economic, health and environmental wellbeing.

NETWORKS AND PARTNERSHIPS: Building strong partnerships and networks that benefit the local community, improve outcomes for service users, and contribute to social and community research and planning throughout the Central Coast.

PEOPLE AND CULTURE: Building a friendly, positive, professional and client-focused workforce through effective human resource management, appropriate training and professional development, and the promotion of an ethical, fair and supportive culture.

COMMITTEE'S REPORT

ORGANISATIONAL CAPACITY AND CAPABILITY: Building a resilient and thriving organisation that is committed to integrity and transparency in governance and management practices, and effectively and efficiently uses its resources and assets to support service users, community engagement, and the fulfillment of these strategic aims.

Key Performance Indicators

PROGRAM AND SERVICES:

All childcare services have maintained high quality accreditation during the transition to registration under the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority (AECQA) which is now the national licensing, regulatory and quality assurance body for childern's services.

All home and community aged care services were assessed and found to be compliant under the new national Community Care Common Standards.

Peninsula Community Centre's Problem Gambling Counselling Service changed its name to Gambling Solutions. It successfully completed the QMS quality review under the QIC Health and Community Service Standards and has been fully accredited.

The Alcohol and Other Drug program run with Evolution Youth Service concluded its three year contract at 30 June 2012. This program is the only AOD program with a tertiary qualified AOD counsellor on staff. We have been successful in tendering for an enhanced three-year contract to continue delivering this program for 2012-2015.

The PCC successfully prepared its home and community care programs for the transition to new funding contracts with the Commonwealth Government through the Department of Helath and Ageing (DoHA) from 1 July 2012. At this date, the Commonwelath took funding responsibility for all aged care services delivered to people over 65. The NSW Department of Ageing, Disability and Home Care (ADHC) continues to fund services to people younger than 65 and to people with a disability. These new contracts with DoHA and ADHC have increased our ability to provide services.

All services have met contracted service outputs.

NETWORKS AND PARTNERSHIPS:

The Peninsula Community Centre Inc continued its active involvement in networks such as: Peninsula Interagency Group; Central Coast Neighbourhood & Community Centres Forum; Central Coast Ageing & Disability Association; Central Coast Volunteering; Central Coast Not for Profit Forum; NSW COPS (Community Options); Local Community Services Association (NSW), Peninsula Community Drug Action Team.

The Peninsula Community Centre also actively participates in the Department of Family & Community Services (FACS) One Place One Plan Community Reference Group and the ADHC Community Care Access Point Stakeholders Forum.

A close partnership has been established with Coastwide Child & Family Services (CCFS) to continue delivery of family day care services on the Peninsula. The Peninsula & District Family Day Care Service was transferred to Gosford Family Day Care under CCFS. This brought our own 20 family day care educators into a larger group of approximately 70 educators across the LGA.

COMMITTEE'S REPORT

PEOPLE AND CULTURE:

All children's services staff have minimum qualifications (Certificate III) in early childhood or children's services. A number if employees have begun a Certificate IV in OOSH and all site supervisors have completed a Diploma in Children's Services.

The Peninsula Community Centre Inc successfully reclassified and transitioned 48 staff from the old NSW Socail and Community Services Award to the modern Social, Community, Home Care and Disability Services Industry Award 2010 by the deadline of 30 June. This reclassification process was necessary to meet the classifications set down by Fair Work Australia and estalish baseline pay rates ready for the implementation of the Equal Remuneration Order which takes effect from 1 December 2012. All positions have up to date position descriptions.

A Human Resources/Work, Health & Safety Officer was appointed.

ORGANISATIONAL CAPACITY AND CAPABILITY:

Peninsula Community Centre Inc continues to operate profitably. Workers Compensation insurance premiums have fallen by 14% on the previous year. Fringe Benefits Tax has been reduced by 18% and is now stable. However, electricity costs have risen by 59% over the previous year, and insurance costs have more than doubled as new funding agreements have higher coverage requirements.

The PCC has invested significantly in the business during 2011-2012, refurbishing the old cottages that serve as office space, improving IT connections (cabling), replacing old furniture, and replacing old air conditioning systems. This investment has now maximised the utilisation of the available space.

The PCC has completely replaced its telephone systems with a modern VOIP system that has brought each of its nine work sites and every phone into the network. Partnering with CCTS and Optus for the implementation, this new system has reduced telephone costs by 18%.

Achievements/ Significant changes during the year

The Peninsula Links Day brought together service providers and government agencies to showcase the services available to people on the Peninsula. Now in its second year, a greater number of service providers had stalls and more than 500 people walked through during the day.

The PCC's Ageing and Disability Services Group received \$150,000 from ADHC to provide one-off squalor and boarding clean-ups across the Central Coast. Through our cas management approach, people who have found themselves in situations of squalor can be connected with social supports and networks that minimise recurrence of future hoarding.

The Peninsula and District Family Day Care Scheme was transferred to Gosford Family Day Care (a scheme operated by Coastwide Child and Family Services).

COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Future Developments

Working with a marketing consultancy, the Peninsula Community Centre Inc will develop and implement a Strategic Marketing Plan including a Social Media Strategy.

Although parts of the business must meet specific accreditation or quality standards, the Peninsula Community Centre Inc recognises that future funding agreements will require an organisation-wide approach to quality management systems and internal quality auditing. Negotiations have begun on obtaining accreditation through QIC Health and Community Services Standards for the whole organisation by 2015.

Events after Balance Date

Peninsula Community Centre Inc has been successful in obtaining a new contract with the Ministry of Health (NSW) for the delivery of ComPacks across the Gosford LGA. This contract is worth \$520,000 per annum.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

Peninsula Community Centre Inc. as an individual entity. Peninsula Community Centre Inc. is an association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009.

Basis of Preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009.

Peninsula Community Centre Inc. has elected to early adopt the pronouncements AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements to the annual reporting period beginning 1 July 2010.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Accounting Policies

Going Concern

The financial report of the association has been prepared on a going concern basis. This basis has been applied as the committee members have received a guarantee of continuing government support and it is the committee members' belief that such government support will continue to be made available.

Income Tax

The Association is exempt from Income Tax under section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of manufactured products includes direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate portion of variable and fixed overheads. Overheads are applied on the basis of normal operating capacity. Costs are assigned on the basis of weighted average costs.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are shown at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by external independent valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The cost of fixed assets constructed within the association includes the cost of materials, direct labour, borrowing costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the income statement during the financial period in which they are incurred.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised leased assets, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed AssetDepreciation RatePlant & Equipment5 - 25%Motor Vehicles15 - 25%Furniture & Fittings5 - 25%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the income statement. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Asset Capitalisation Policy

The Association's policy for the capitalisation of non-current assets is that they will be recorded in the asset register and the Statement of Financial Position if the asset purchased cost in excess of \$5,000. This policy is in line with grant funding requirements.

Financial Instruments

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the association commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss' in which case transaction costs are expenses to profit or loss immediately.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Ay excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in the income and expenditure statement.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Impairment testing is performed annually for goodwill and intangible assets with indefinite lives.

Financial Assets

Financial assets are initially recognised on the cost basis, including acquisition charges associated with the financial asset. The carrying amounts of financial assets are reviewed annually by the Committee. The recoverable amounts are assessed from the quoted market value for shares in listed companies. The expected net cash flows from financial assets have not been discounted to their present value in determining the recoverable amounts, unless otherwise stated.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. Those cashflows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows.

Contributions are made by the entity to an employee's personal superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Revenue and Other Income

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measure reliably.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised on a straight line basis over the financial year.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities, which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO, are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Economic Dependence

Peninsula Community Centre Inc. is dependent upon government departments for their grant funding. At the date of the report, the Committee has no reason to believe that the departments will not continue to support Peninsula Community Centre Inc.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The committee members evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information.

Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

Key estimates - Fringe Benefits Tax Liability

During the current year the Association lodged the remaining past years FBT returns noted as key estimates last year. The actual FBT liability for those years is recorded in the Statement of Financial Position with in Trade and Other Payables at a value of \$126,049. Since year end that liability has been paid.

Key judgments - Income Tax Exemption

The committee are of the opinion that the association's exemption from income tax under section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 is still valid and the association has no liability for income tax.

Key judgments - Unspent Grants

The association records grants unspent as a liability within grants repayable until direction is received from the funding bodies in relation to retention or repayment of the funds.
